CITY LAUNCHES WEBSITE TO MONITOR POTHOLES

Indianapolis has created a new way for the public to track pothole reports by launching a Pothole Viewer website. During pothole-filling season, roughly March through June, the Department of Public Works sends out 10 to 15 crews daily to fill reported potholes. This month, a DPW news release said, its crews average a turnaround time of less than three days.

The new website allows users to view open pothole requests across the city or at a neighborhood level. They also can see potholes that have been filled in the past six months, color-coded by response time. Users can report a pothole or track one they reported earlier through the Mayor's Action Center by calling (317) 327-4MAC (4622) or by visiting www.indy.gov/potholes.

CITIZEN'S TRANSFER STATION

Do you ever find yourself making a trip to the landfill to get rid of heavy trash and/or debris? Save yourself 75% off the cost of going to the landfill or using a private service to haul away your items. Haul them to the <u>Marion County Citizens' Transfer Station: 2567 S. Belmont Ave., Indianapolis, IN 46221</u>

They are open on Saturdays from 8am to 4pm. The cost to drop-off a safely-loaded car-load is \$2.00 and the cost for a pickup truck load is \$5.00. Trailer loads are not permitted. Only regular or heavy trash items will be accepted. Items like construction materials should be reused if possible.

INDY PARKS NOW HIRING LIFEGUARDS FOR SUMMER

Indy Parks and Recreation employs about 320 seasonal lifeguards and pool supervisors to operate our 20 aquatic facilities. Lifeguarding is a great job for high school and college students, teachers looking for summer employment, or older adults looking to become more involved in their community. Interested applicants may apply online. Indy Parks' lifeguards are trained and certified using the StarGuard certification program which covers lifeguarding skills, water rescue techniques, First Aid, and CPR. The 3-day training is completed at Indy Parks' internal training facility and is available almost every weekend from now until the beginning of summer break. Successful completion of the course not only includes proof of competency in water rescue techniques, but also includes having an A+ attitude, being on time, and showing maturity, responsibility and respect. Applicants should possess an outgoing personality along with excellent customer service skills, and enjoy working with children, parents and co-workers.

To qualify, applicants must be at least 16 years old, a Marion County resident, able to pass a swimming test consisting of a 200 yard swim using front crawl or breast stroke, one minute tread with hands out of the water, and successful retrieval of a 10-pound diving brick from 10 feet of water. Working hours and conditions can vary throughout the summer.

DPW REPORT FOR PORTIONS OF PERRY TOWNSHIP

Restrictions have been removed until construction resumes in the Spring of 2013 on Emerson Avenue from I-65 to Shelbyville Road. Speed limit during construction is 30 MPH and regulatory sign have been posted. \

Restrictions will be in place on Morgantown Road and County Line Rd for tree clearing in preparation for intersection improvements. This may be the roundabout or traffic signals that were promised a year or so ago with Railroad Rd and County Line Rd. as well. Nothing has been said about latter.

Lane restrictions are in place along Madison Avenue and East Street from Troy Avenue to Hanna Avenue through July 2013.

Restrictions may be in place around 9th Street and Thompson Rd. while traffic improvements are underway.

ROAD SAFETY & TRAVEL TIPS

Spring vacations are quickly approaching and many of us will be hitting the open road. From carrying your passengers safely to avoiding the dangers of drowsy and aggressive driving, be aware of your surroundings and get everyone back home again safely.

Distracted Driving

Engaging in any activity that could divert your attention away from the primary task of driving safely creates a hazard. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) says there are 3 main types of distraction: Manual, Visual and Cognitive. While driving, texting (illegal in Indiana), reaching for or talking on cell phones, smoking, eating, children or pets in the car, loud music, and any number of other distractions can lead to devastating consequences. Be alert and aware. Pull off the road temporarily if something is more important than driving.

Drowsy Driving

NHTSA estimates that fatigue, whether from medications or lack of sleep, causes at least 1,500 fatalities and 40,000 injuries annually. In fact, one in every six deadly car crashes results from a fatigue-impaired driver. Recognize the warning signs – lane drift, difficulty keeping your eyes open, bobbing head to name a few - and do the right thing. Have a designated driver if you know you are overtired or on medication that may affect your alertness. Park the car and have a nap. These basic rules also apply to the leading cause of death for Americans 17-24 years old – drunk driving. It's all about acknowledging the dangers and being aware that most auto accidents are avoidable.

Aggressive Driving

Aggressive driving is a traffic violation. Tailgating, excessive speeds, weaving through traffic, running stop lights and signs, etc. all fall into the category of aggressive driving. Aggressive driving accounts for more than half of all traffic fatalities according to the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety. Aggressive driving can sometimes lead to road rage which can be a criminal offense. Gesturing can lead to physical confrontation, assault and even murder. There are more drivers on the roads than ever before, so obey posted speed limits and keep to the right if you are a slower driver. If you are cut off, do not confront the other driver. If you are being chased, drive with the flow of traffic and call 911 if possible.

Kids in Cars

Indiana law requires people, whether they're in a car or truck, to wear a seat belt. Children younger than 8 must be restrained in a child safety seat or booster seat. Children 12 and younger should not sit in the front seat. In 2011 the American Academy of Pediatrics issued a new policy which advises parents to

keep their child in a rear-facing car seat until age 2, or until they reach the maximum height and weight limit for their seat. It also advises that most children will need to ride in a belt-positioning booster seat until they have reached 4 feet 9 inches tall and are between 8 and 12 years of age.

The Indianapolis Fire Department and Firefighters Survive Alive! (327-7956), in partnership with SafeKids.org and the Marion County Health Department (221-3145) offers free car seat fittings and inspections by appointment. Car seat inspections are free unless it is determined that a replacement seat is needed. Replacement seats are usually available at cost and can be provided at no cost with proof of financial need.
